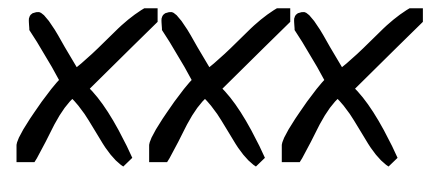


What is this?
